"Magical" twilight market launched

Friday night market where families can gather, watch a movie under twinkling fairy lights, and enjoy food truck fare at 'candlelit' tables, is a new highlight in Pāpāmoa this summer.

The new Pāpāmoa Twilight Market is driven by the team behind the Sunday Pāpāmoa Community Market at Te Manawa ō Pāpāmoa School, and launched at the end of

Market founder Carmen Cristescu savs her 'marketeers' asked her to organise a night market, which she agreed to if it could be "beautiful and magical".

"I wanted to create something really special and different; something that's going to last forever."

The "something special" includes fairy lights, beautifully arranged tables with battery-powered candles, and a free familyfriendly movie on a big outdoor screen, every week. All while the sun sets, and with a few surprises.

The market primarily features top-tier food vendors and a select few arts and crafts stalls, offering something different to the daytime Sunday market. You won't find produce, seedlings, plants, a barber on-site, eggs, or honey. Instead, expect an evening filled with unique experiences.

Carmen says the interest from potential vendors has been incredible, and she is dedicated to bringing something "truly special"

Being able to provide free entertainment to local families is important to her, including screening Christmas movies in December. Children can also enjoy the playground at the school during the market.

"I want to be able to offer something to all families, who may not usually be able to afford to go out. At the market you can always get something inexpensive to eat and make it a cheap night out for the whole family. There are so many kids in Pāpāmoa."

The project is a labour of love for Carmen, who runs the Sunday and Friday markets to provide a service to the community.

"I get to offer something to the community. I love it."

The night market is weather dependent and held every Friday over summer at Te Manawa ō Pāpāmoa School from 5pm, with the movie starting about 7.30pm. To keep up to date, follow the Facebook page 'Pāpāmoa Community Market'.

"Our promise remains that all items donated stay in Pāpāmoa, and are distributed to those in need, in your commu-

Residents are asked to leave donations at their letterbox. Recommended items are tinned food, non-perishables, pasta and rice, cleaning products, baby food and formula, nappies, pet food, personal hygiene items and sanitary products.

"And a polite plea – no expired items please," says Bruce

Although the food drive happens annually, each year there are people in the community who are taken aback at the presence of so many emergency services vehicles.

"Do not be alarmed by the sound of sirens all over Pāpāmoa, as our teams will be very loud and obvious as they snake slowly through the streets of Pāpāmoa. Please give generously if you are able."

The Sands Town Centre to open 5 Nov

xcitement is building in Pāpāmoa East as stage one of The Sands Town Centre will officially open on 5 November, a month ahead of schedule.

The anchor tenant is New World, together with a large-scale Anytime Fitness gym, and a new food precinct offering sushi, kebabs, pizza, and more. It is anticipated that more than 150 jobs will be supported from stage one alone, positioning the centre as a significant economic contributor to the region.

Behind the project is established developer Bluehaven Group, which regards the projected billion-dollar town centre as a 'once in a generation' opportunity and is thrilled to see this milestone occur.

"We are strong advocates for Pāpāmoa East since we embarked on development in the region," says Bluehaven Group Chief Executive Nathan York.

"Fundamental to our development philosophy has always been the establishment of this sub-regional town centre in the heart of Golden Sands, so that we could support those who live along the coastal belt and the wider Bay of Plenty area

"Convenience, quality and prominence for our fast-growing community has driven decision making as we've sought to lay the foundations for one of the most significant and far-

reaching commercial hubs in the Bay of Plenty on completion. Already there are 115,000 people who live within 20 minutes of The Sands, and that number is forecast to grow by over 25 per cent in the next decade."

Within this radius lies the neighbouring Pāpāmoa East/Wairākei urban area largely developed by Bluehaven, plus the greater Pāpāmoa region, Mount Maunganui, Te Puke and Maketū, Rangiuru Business Park, and the future developments of Te Tumu and Bell Road.

Bay of Plenty MP Tom Rutherford says the opening of The Sands Town Centre marks a significant milestone for the development of Pāpāmoa East and the Bay of Plenty.

"It brings new amenities, job opportunities, and economic growth to the region. I look forward to watching The Sands evolve into a thriving heart of our community in the years to come."

The Sands marks the fourth and largest sub-regional shopping centre for the wider Bay of Plenty. At 230,000 square metres on completion (or the equivalent of 50

rugby fields), it will open over a number of stages, with Mitre-10 Mega announced to anchor the next stage together with national and international brands. Stage Three is also almost fully leased, and both stages are set to open in 2026.

On completion, The Sands will feature retail and mixed commercial outlets, a comprehensive health hub, community facilities, home improvement centres, increased hospitality offerings, hotels and accommodation, and government services.

Access to The Sands is currently via Emerald Shores Drive (off Pāpāmoa Beach Road), Stevenson Drive (accessible via Te Okuroa Drive) or The Boulevard, with a combination of roadways, cycle and walkways, and buses all servicing the area. The Pāpāmoa East Interchange on the Tauranga Eastern Link will offer major access to the wider region once it opens in mid-2026.

Family fun activities and opening specials are planned for the first days and weeks of opening. \blacksquare

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"Forgotten suburb" reminds Mayor

Pāpāmoa is Tauranga's biggest suburb but often feels like "the forgotten suburb", Tauranga Mayor Mahe Drysdale heard at the Pāpāmoa Residents and Ratepayers Association's (PRRA) October meeting.

The newly elected Mayor was there to meet the community, give an update on council, and listen to residents' concerns – of which there was no shortage.

Roading – including the state of Pāpāmoa Beach Road, Domain Road, Te Okuroa Drive, and speed bumps – was a recurring gripe. Another hot topic was the urgent need for safe tsunami escape routes. And there was anger about the cost of rates, effectively pricing some people out of the area.

Seventeen questions were presented to the Mayor, who was well-received at the meeting. However, he largely responded by saying he needed more information to provide answers, while assuring attendees that he was taking their concerns into consideration

Tsunami evacuation

PRRA chair Philip Brown emphasised the organisation's commitment to establishing clear and safe tsunami evacuation routes to the Pāpāmoa Hills. Philip noted that while residents would need to evacuate to the hills on foot in the event of a tsunami threat, there are currently no footpaths along the far end of Parton Road or the overbridge.

"It could be deadly serious, and we are not prepared for it.

"PRRA has been putting forward proposals for evacuation paths; at the moment not much is happening."



The Mayor was asked why there was an ongoing delay and if there was any chance of progress. He said the council was due to be briefed on this in the next month.

"It's something we are absolutely aware of. I give my word we will certainly look at it and see what we can do."

Te Tumu Development Levy

Another concern was targeted rates for the Te Tumu growth area (Pāpāmoa and Wairākei) from 2024/25. Pāpāmoa ward councillor Steve Morris campaigned on this

issue as being unfair for local residents. The Mayor was asked if the Te Tumu levy would be removed.

"This is something we have heard a lot from Steve about," says Mahe. "This is an area we are doing a bit more work on, we have done a poor job in this city of paying for growth."

Roading

"Why does Pāpāmoa get treated like a backwater when it comes to roading infrastructure?" The Mayor pushed back at this question, citing the Pāpāmoa East Interchange, which is due to open in mid-2026.

"Tauranga City Council is spending \$100 million out here putting an interchange in off the expressway," says Mahe. "It's not that there is no money being spent out here. Whether that is the greatest priority for it, I didn't make that decision.

"If you look at the last 10 to 15 years and amount of growth out here, there has been a huge amount of money spent, most of it under the ground.

"With the amount of growth in Pāpāmoa, there has been a huge amount of investment."

Pāpāmoa Beach Road

This 50-year-old road is one of the busiest in Tauranga, and has not been upgraded since it was built, Philip says.

Pāpāmoa Beach Road is not fit for purpose; it needs to be asphalt and have safe crossings like the equivalent roads in Mount Maunganui, a resident told the Mayor.

The last 500m of Domain Road is still rural, and as a key tsunami exit route, needs to be improved, the PRRA says. And Te Okuroa Drive needs to be upgraded to the four-lane road originally planned.

Communication

Mahe says the council is committed to finding better ways to engage with the community.

"I'm hearing you tonight. We have got to keep it affordable, so people aren't forced to leave and move on.

"Being a junior surf coach at Pāpāmoa is such a rewarding experience. Growing up by the ocean and now being a lifeguard myself, I know how important it is for our kids to stay safe in the water, and I love sharing that knowledge while having fun. With the amazing crew and resources we have,

coaching is easier than you think. It's a great way to give back to the community and help keep our beaches and kids safe."

Fellow junior surf coach Gillian Johnston says coaching gives you the opportunity to watch your kids grow, build their confidence, and enjoy being present with them while they do this.

"It's a fantastic way to bond with my own kids and meet other like-minded families. You don't need to be an expert to be a great coach. With simple drills, fun activities, and plenty of support from the club, you'll start off helping to encourage the kids and keeping things fun. It's all about creating a positive space for them to learn. Seeing their smiles and knowing you're helping them grow is so rewarding. If you're thinking about it, jump in. I've loved every minute of coaching, and I'm sure you will too."


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

Police news: motorcycle clocked 226kmh on TEL

ur Road Policing Team recently arrested a 20-year-old motorcyclist who had been riding his bike at 226kmh on the Tauranga Eastern Link – a way too dangerous speed.

After being charged with dangerous driving, he was also suspended from driving and had his motorcycle impounded.

Even worse was the driver doing 220kmh in his vehicle, which was fitted with a 'space saver' spare tyre. It didn't have a WOF and had already been ordered off the road by the Police due to defects. This driver was also charged with dangerous driving and has been convicted.

You can probably think of descriptive words for these drivers. Most of us are just going about our daily business, but we have these people on the road putting our families at risk. The message is really just keep the speeds down, and think about other road users

Retail crime has also been a focus of Western Bay of Plenty Police. That includes Pāpāmoa. Since the Retail Crime Unit started earlier this year, it has charged 488 people with retail crime offences, resulting in just over 2400 charges.

They have also been carrying out visits to our well-known repeat and recidivist thieves, in an effort to prevent them from reoffending. And retail outlets themselves

are doing a great job in deterring shoplifters. As a result, I have seen a marked reduction in shoplifting and retail theft being reported to Police.

We often have clusters of burglaries

occurring which can be attributed to one offender. A recent example was one person arrested for three overnight burglaries here in Pāpāmoa, and a further one in the Mount. He is currently in custody. And a Pāpāmoa

offender apprehended in Te Puke is now charged with six burglaries and eight thefts. He is also in custody. These two people were responsible for the bulk of our crime in one month, and with them out of the picture, hopefully the community can feel a little safer.


But please be vigilant. We still have reports of **tradies' vehicles** being broken into and tools taken, and of cars broken into in an attempt to steal them. Although we have suspects for these, prevention is better than dealing with the hassle of having your day ruined by a thief. Keep your vehicles secure and valuables out of sight.

Lastly, **scammers** are still very active. Whether it's an online marketplace with a scammer deceiving someone into handing over money, iTunes card scams, fake \$50 notes circulating, sextortion, investment scams, identity theft, or simply receiving a phone call purporting to be from Spark or a bank, there are ever more inventive ways for criminals to take your money.

Scammers seem to be able to talk people into logging into their banking accounts, handing over passwords and login details. There is no worse feeling than having your bank account cleaned out.

Take a minute and go onto the Netsafe website to check out all the types of scams: netsafe.org.nz/scams. Think twice before handing over any passwords, banking details or making that payment. ■

ring is here - and so is the pollen! Unfortunately, for some of us, this time of year can be pretty uncomfortable: red, swollen, and itchy eyes can really get you

Just like any other allergic reaction, eye allergies are caused by a misfiring of the immune system. The body's natural defence mechanism reacts to things that aren't really harmful (like pollen) and releases a chemical called histamine, which causes swelling and inflammation. The blood vessels in the conjunctiva (clear membrane on the surface of the eye) swell and the eyes become red. Sometimes the eyelids also become swollen, and there might be some light sensitivity. Often the eyes water and there may be some stringy discharge or mucous in the tears. A big giveaway for ocular allergy is the itching - and children especially want to rub their eyes or blink a lot!

There are many allergy relief products out there. Some of the same oral medicines that you use for nasal allergies also work for eye allergies (ask your GP or pharmacist which option is right for you). A cold, damp facecloth can provide some temporary relief. Taking your contact lenses out can also help alleviate some of the irritation. And don't rub your eyes, no matter how much they itch! It will only make the irritation worse.

Sometimes eyedrops will be the most effective for itchy, watery eyes - but not all allergy eyedrops are created equal. Some



eyedrops (called decongestants, or 'anti-red' drops) should not be used for more than a few days at a time, and can cause a rebound redness if used too frequently. Some eye drops are a topical lubricant (artificial tears), which can be used to soothe the eyes and flush out any antigens (e.g. pollens) that the body is reacting to. Some eye drops work over a longer time period, and the effects last longer, so are best used before you know your symptoms will hit. These are often combined with an antihistamine to relieve the itch quickly and will require a prescription.

News in Brief

Construction of the new permanent pathway over the dunes on Pāpāmoa Beach Road, near Alexander Place, was due to begin at the end of October and is expected to be complete by February. Pedestrians are advised to use the temporary path provided while work is taking place. The council is also constructing four swales, designed to help with stormwater run-off from the road during high levels of rainfall and reduce flooding of Pāpāmoa Beach Road. These are located at low points along the shared pathway route.

Opal Drive daytime closure

A daytime closure for through traffic is in

place on Opal Drive, on weekdays between 7am and 6pm, to support new pump station construction. Through traffic is diverted via Topaz Drive, Domain Road and Doncaster Avenue. Residents continue to have access to their property at all times. Pedestrian and cycle access remain at all times. Tauranga City Council is investing in a new wastewater pump station on Opal Drive to replace the existing facility. This new pump station will ensure a resilient wastewater service for the Pāpāmoa community that can accommodate future growth, the council says.

he Pāpāmoa Santa Parade and "Light Up The Waterway" Matariki event are two of our community's most loved activities, bringing together thousands of locals each

Behind these fantastic celebrations is Pāpāmoa Unlimited, our local business association – similar to "Downtown Tauranga" or "Mount Maunganui Mainstreet." Its funding comes from a targeted rate that Council collects from commercial property owners within Pāpāmoa Unlimited's defined area, which currently covers Pāpāmoa Plaza, Fashion Island, and a few shops at the Domain. Despite having just 16 per cent of the budget of Downtown Tauranga, Pāpāmoa Unlimited still delivers two of the most significant events in the city.

Maybe it's time to expand Pāpāmoa Unlimited's catchment area to include the shops at the Coast development in the west through to the new town centre in Pāpāmoa East. This would require close consultation with business owners to ensure everyone is on board. If an expansion goes ahead, the challenge will be for Pāpāmoa Unlimited to create events that benefit each of the eight commercial zones along our 18km stretch of Pāpāmoa while continuing to add vibrancy to the wider community.



This is an extremely early heads-up. There is no proposal before Council, and we would need to consult well with local businesses and residents before it gets anywhere near a decision.

The intention of this Bill is to remove the nationwide trading and alcohol restrictions on Good Friday and Easter

Currently, local authorities decide if trade is allowed on Easter Sunday. Where trade is allowed, employees have the right to refuse to work without reper-

This Bill effectively means trade could occur carte blanche on Easter Friday and Sunday without the current public holiday restrictions. It retains the provision allowing employees the right to refuse to work and extends this clause to Good Friday.

Currently, alcohol cannot be sold on Easter Friday and Sunday except in very limited circumstances (alongside Christmas Day and ANZAC Day prior to 1pm).

This Bill would mean alcohol can be sold on Easter Friday and Sunday, as if they were normal trading days.



any Pāpāmoa gardening and art enthusiasts will be preparing to hit the local trails this month during the much-anticipated BOP Garden & Art Festival.

The biennial festival will be held from November 14-17 and will showcase the talents of gardeners and artists from Paengaroa to Pahoia, including, of course, Pāpāmoa.

Paula Knight (pictured) is one of those returning. While her coastal art is familiar to many, Paula's home-based studio is surrounded by a compact and colourful tropical garden where 30-year-old natives combine with colourful tropicals, all fuelled by seawood from across the road. She is on the trail as an artist and garden stop.

Festival director Marc Anderson says long-time favourites like Paula will be joined by those new to the festival, and he's confident there will be something to please every-

In amongst all the beauty on display at the festival will also be learning opportunities, and Pāpāmoa has a part to play in this too. Ticketholders timetabling a stop at Te Manawa ō Pāpāmoa School Garden into their day

will find an organic food garden lovingly and carefully crafted by school pupils. Every child has had the opportunity to participate in gardening and learning about the life cycle of plants from seed sowing through to seed saving, Marc says.

The festival's Bloom in the Bay also involves Pāpāmoa folk. It will include displays by landscape gardeners, exhibitors, live music, food and beverages, a festival gallery and a wellbeing zone. New participants include a tattooist, a sauna operator, musicians, and tai chi, yoga, and reiki practitioners.
